Laughing lightheartedly as she reminisces about that night, she explains, "It's a running joke that I may be the only girl who's ever made a man propose twice."

At the time of the engagement Heather was living and working in San Antonio and Bill in Mason, Texas. Heather says the very first thing she did was reserve the ceremony and reception location: Old Glory Ranch in Wimberley. Her grandparents have a ranch just a few miles from the venue on the Blanco river. Heather said that it looked so much like the place she had spent so much time during her childhood, she couldn't imagine not getting married there.

She confessed that she didn't start planning in earnest until July when she moved home to Llano, a mere three months before the wedding date. She recalls, "The staff at Old Glory Ranch paid unbelievable attention to detail." According to Heather, the staff there either booked everything outright



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for her or recommended places to go to get even the smallest things. "I could not believe how relaxed I was through the whole process."

Heather started her wedding day having a light breakfast and getting pampered with the bridal party at Becky's Sunberry Patch a few miles from the ranch. The party then retreated to the house the family had rented on the grounds of the ranch. Heather spent the hours between the salon and the ceremony relaxing with friends and family. They got dressed, chatted and had pictures taken. "I couldn't believe I was so calm. I had one hundred percent faith in the staff. I kept thinking to myself, 'When is it going to hit me?'"

Pumpkins of all shapes and sizes adorned every table and antique wagon in sight, while vintage chandeliers hung from the oak trees. The beverages were served with Koozies or in plastic cups imprinted with the new couple's names and the wine and beer was chilled in old-fashioned tin tubs. The atmosphere was full-on country chic, complete with bottled water delivery service by adorable miniature donkeys with saddle baskets garnished with their own floral wedding finery.

Guests were treated to a buffet of Greek salad, grilled vegetables, quail, shrimp brochette, rice and French bread catered by Pappadeaux Seafood Kitchen.

The couple danced the night away with style. It seemed everyone had a fabulous time. Heather says they are still receiving compliments on the party to this day.
